PASSING OVER

Passover is the holiday that every Jew knows about. It is, without doubt, the most observed Jewish holiday. No matter what else a Jew may do or not do during the rest of the year, Passover is the week when every Jewish inclination comes out into the light of day and takes center stage.

Much to my fascination, Jews who ate BLTs the rest of the year morph into the Lubavitcher rebbe for one week, changing dishes out and doing a clean sweep of the pantry, closely examining any foodstuffs that might enter the house with the absolute determination that everything be kosher for Passover. For this one week, the highest standards must be observed.

My fear is that amid the frantic preparations and probable indigestion coming our way for Passover, we may pass over the most important value of the holiday. As we sit around our Seder tables this year, we would all do well to discuss what our freedom means to us today.

Passover is first and foremost the *z'man cheiruteinu*, the time of our freedom. Every year we celebrate our passage from slavery into freedom in the present tense, as if we ourselves are going out to freedom. This year, more than most, it seems that our freedom is a topic for discussion. Our nation is at war, and yet many of us feel no safer. The fear of terrorism impels us to freely give up elements of our privacy that in different times would be unheard of. The openness of our society, the very trait that has fueled our growth and our greatness, now seems open for debate. Even as we celebrate our ancient movement to freedom, there are serious doubts as to how we can maintain our freedom today.

Passover teaches us that the foundational value of Judaism is freedom. It was only in freedom that we could become a people, worship God, and establish a social order worthy of blessing. It defined who we were more than three thousand years ago and it still does.

Freedom is not only praiseworthy, but potentially frightening. When our ancestors left slavery, they soon complained about all of the uncertainties that their liberty brought in its wake. They clamored to go back to Egypt and to return to the conditions of slavery in return for the security of knowing from where their next meal might come. They were willing to trade liberty for security.

Absolute security can never be established and will never be enough to justify the erosion of liberty. This is as true in our national life as it is in our religious life. I pray this year, starting at our Seders, that our Jewish value of freedom will inform our national life and that our gratitude for our God given freedom will fuel our convictions.

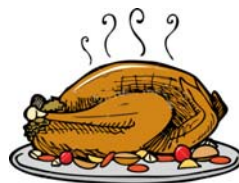

SISTERHOOD SHORTS

More than 100 women from the Cape Cod Synagogue and many churches in the Mid-Cape area got together in early February for the Annual Sisterhood Interfaith Program. The topic this year was *Love Thy Neighbor as Thyself*.

After the vandalism incident in November at the Chabad Jewish Center, West Main St., Hyannis, a rally was held at Barnstable High School the following week with the theme, *No Place for Hate*. Following that, the Sisterhood Committee discussed the Interfaith topic for this year and decided that a follow-up would make a good subject for the Interfaith program.

The panel of clergy participants included Rabbi Frelund, Reverend Diane Casey-Lee, Cape Cod Council of Churches, and James Kirshner, Cape Cod Sangha, a Cape based Buddhist organization. Each panelist spoke very well about the teachings of Judaism, Christianity and Buddhism and what they tell their followers about loving the stranger in their midst.

It was quite enlightening to hear each one of our panelists talk about all three religions. Mr. Kirshner explained the teaching of Buddhism very clearly to an audience for the most part unfamiliar with the details of Buddhist theology. The question and answer period was also very informative as people in the audience asked the panelists detailed questions. It was also very clear that we all have much more in common when we discuss how we treat the stranger than we have differences.

Everyone was served lunch after the program. Again, our home made noodle puddings were a big hit!

A big thank you to our hostesses, our bakers and to the many women who shopped, cooked and helped set up the Social Hall. A special thank you to our overall kitchen helper David Silverman who manned the ovens, made the coffee, helped with all the details and was our true Kitchen Maven.



WHAT'S IN A NAME?

RITUAL COMMITTEE INSIGHTS

From baking hamantaschen to the *Purim Spiel*, thank you to all for a fun celebration.

Passover will be the next holiday we celebrate. In Israel the first and seventh days are celebrated as full holidays. The five Intermediate Days, *Chol Ha-Moed*, are celebrated as half holidays. Together with *Shavuot* and *Sukkot*, Passover is one of the three pilgrim festivals, *Shalosh Regalim*, during which the entire Jewish populace historically made a pilgrimage to the Temple in Jerusalem.

In most traditions, the consumption of *chametz* is forbidden during Passover. *Chametz* refers to either a grain product that is already fermented, breads, certain types of cake and most alcoholic beverages or to a substance that can cause fermentation, such as yeast, sourdough or high fructose corn syrup.

The Torah commandments regarding *chametz* are to remove all *chametz* from one's home, including items made with *chametz* before the first day of Passover. Those items may be simply used up, thrown out, historically destroyed by burning, or given or sold to non-Jews or non-Samaritans.

We read the *Haggadah*, a religious text that sets out the order of the *Passover Seder*. Reading the *Haggadah* is a fulfillment of the scriptural commandment to each Jew to tell your children about Jewish liberation from slavery in Egypt as described in the *Book of Exodus* in the Torah.

Please join us at our congregational home to retell and relive the story of the Exodus and our redemption as a people. We will share a marvelous traditional *Seder* meal, prayer and song with families and friends. A group of very dedicated volunteers who take great pride in all the details of the *Seder* prepares this meal. We appreciate greatly that many congregants have made various donations to make our *Seder* a success.

If you have comments or suggestions, please relay them to your Ritual Committee members as we all strive to improve our religious experience.
