A Deeper Attachment

I had a meaningful conversation lately that arose from a chance encounter. I was talking with an acquaintance who works as an EMT here on the Cape when the subject of death came up. Since both of us are in frequent contact with death, albeit in very different contexts, it was not such a strange thing to speak about. The EMT said to me, "You get cold. I see such terrible things, it's the only way to deal with it."

So I asked him, "Have you ever shown up at that scene of an accident or a fire and known the victim?"

"No," he answered. "That's the difference between us," I remarked. "I almost always know the people affected. If I ever get cold, I need to examine myself and question whether or not I can still function as a rabbi."

People have often asked me, and I am sure other clergy, if funerals are the hardest part of my work. Yes, they are, but not without some sense of personal value. It is a *mitzvah* of the highest order to accompany the dead for burial, and as a rabbi I have the additional *mitzvah* of guiding a family through the traditional actions and symbols of grief mourning. My job is to hold some sense of order amidst the swirling chaos of loss. There is a strict line between the mourners and the rabbi, or there should be. So what happens when I have come to know and love the people over whose funerals I am presiding?

This was not an academic conversation I had with the EMT. After five years at the Cape Cod Synagogue, it is rare that there is a funeral for a person I don't know. On the contrary, I am more and more likely to have more than a casual acquaintance with those I bury. Getting cold while it was never really an option, now seems an impossibility. As beloved members of our community die, the sense of loss has become more personal. In no way would I compare that sense with the sharp and wrenching pain that family and friends experience over the loss of a loved one, I would be less than honest to deny that I feel it in some way, too. It may not be the most "professional" response, and certainly not a detached and philosophical attitude in the face of death, but it is real.

Why now? I think that the longer I am a part of the Synagogue, the more I have come to truly appreciate and value so many of the people that I see here. Perhaps it is also the passage of my own years and the aging and generation changes in my family. For these reasons and more, funerals seem to get a little bit harder for me with the movement of time. That's not necessarily a bad thing. I have grown comfortable with the idea that I am more likely to cry over a death, if not in front of family members and friends, then afterward when I drive away from a cemetery, in the privacy of my own thoughts. It is a measure of genuine affection and attachment, and that is only for the good.

Woman of the Year

Gloria Rudman has received the prestigious Mercy Otis Warren Woman of the Year Award. The award is presented to a woman who best exemplifies the philosophy of the democratic process by an ongoing commitment to the Barnstable community over the years.

Gloria has been involved in the schools, government, community social service organizations, active learning groups and the Cape Cod Synagogue for 39 years. Her special talent for bringing people to a consensus while respecting their differences is an extension of Mercy Otis Warren's ideals and values.

Mercy Otis Warren was born in the village of West Barnstable in 1728. She was a playwright, a poet, a historian, a pioneer in woman's rights, an advocate of the Bill of Rights, and a champion of liberty and the Republic.

Now retired, Gloria was a Clinical Social Worker at the Kidney Dialysis Center from 1983 to 2008. She received a BA in Education from Brooklyn College and an MA at Smith College Graduate School of Social Work. She is the widow of Dr. Harold Rudman and mother of three.

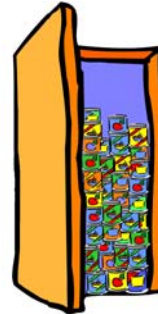

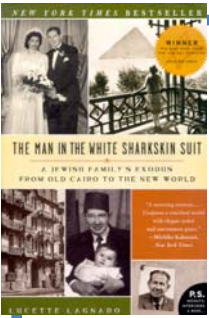

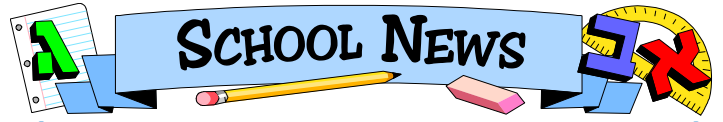


JULY BOOK CLUB

Tuesday, July 6, 7 PM the Cape Cod Synagogue book club will discuss *The Man in the White Sharkskin Suit: My Family's Exodus from Old Cairo to the New World* by Lucette Lagnado.

Now a reporter at the Wall Street Journal, the youngest survivor of an Egyptian Jewish family's gradual ruin tells this story. The story hinges on the Captain, the father of the family who cut a dashing figure in mid-century Cairo while neglecting his family. As a tide of Jews fled Egypt under the Nasser regime, the Captain finally yields in 1963 when the family escapes to Paris, then Brooklyn. Deprived of any means of coping, the father fades but never loses his original air of chivalry manifested in a regular outflow of tiny checks to charitable causes overseas.

RITUAL COMMITTEE INSIGHTS

Recently Rabbi Frelund offered three classes which explored aspects of the liturgy in our *Siddur, Mishkan T'filah*. We discussed the structure of our worship services and the history and meaning of the various prayers. I find that knowing more about the prayers enhances my sense of connection to the worship experience and would like to share some of what we learned.

Traditionally there are three daily services: morning, *Shacharit*, afternoon, *Mincha*, and evening, *Ma'ariv* or *Arvit*. The latter two are recited in tandem, one just before dark, the other immediately after the sun sets. The three services correspond to and in modern times take the place of the sacrifices offered in the Temple in Jerusalem. In Reform practice we generally omit the afternoon service.

The services are made of prayers and songs, poetry and prose. Much of the service consists of strings of blessing, benedictions, in Hebrew, *b'rachot*, or biblical quotations bracketed by blessings that introduce and conclude them. A word used to refer to literary units in the *Siddur* is rubric. At the core of the liturgy are three large rubrics: *Sh'ma* and its blessings, *T'fillah* or *Amidah* and public reading of Torah.

Additionally there are preliminary prayers and songs preceding the *Sh'ma* and closing prayers and songs following the reading of Torah.

The source of much of this information, in addition to class handouts and discussions, is the multi-volume series *My People's Prayer Book*, specifically the chapter *Introduction to the Liturgy: What to Look for in the Service, Volume 1, The Sh'ma and Its Blessings*.
